The collaboration between a special school teacher and a therapist in each of the special school groups had already proved successful in two previous groups, so we are very pleased to be able to expand this program. The different talents in the team and the different training of both professions complement each other and are highly beneficial to the support of many children.

Our young volunteers and interns Johannes Flender, Simon Hildebrand, Naomi Metz, Malte Schmidtkunz and Miriam Schoppel as well as our orthopaedic shoemaker Rudolf Schöning had to return to Germany prematurely in mid-October due to the war. Dear friends!

We have now been at war since October 7, and we are deeply saddened by the suffering of the many people in the Gaza Strip, Israel and the West Bank. We know Palestinians (relatives of employees) and Israelis who have been killed in the war. We are doing what we can, with the means we have, to respond to the violence, and the hardship it has caused, with goodness and to work towards peace.

As in previous years, more than a dozen of our Palestinian youths took part in a camp with the same number of Israeli youths from the Kfar Tikvah facility during the Feast of Tabernacles. The peaceful coexistence of the Kfar Tikvah - LIFEGATE group during the first six days of October at the Sea of Galilee stands in stark contrast to the barbaric terror of the Hamas militiamen, who abused, kidnapped or slaughtered hundreds of women, men, children and infants from Saturday morning onwards because they were Jewish. The resulting Israeli war against Hamas led to an almost unimaginable number of refugees and people who were injured and killed - especially in the Gaza Strip.

We all hear about the violence, fighting, destruction, untold human suffering and mutual hatred between Israelis and Palestinians from the news. But there are also people who want to overcome evil with good. Our contacts with the people of Kfar Tikvah in Israel did not break off; a few days after the terrorist attack, a staff member from Kfar Tikvah called us to find out how the people of LIFEGATE were faring during this difficult time. We have been receiving orthopaedic aids at a low price from the Israeli facility Yad Sarah for years. One of the Yad Sarah employees asked if we knew of any Palestinian people with disabilities to whom Yad Sarah could give a suitable hoist. Medical staff from the Israeli Alvn Hospital asked about children from LIFEGATE who are unable to come to their hospital for treatment due to the current closure of the Palestinian territories. An Israeli friend continues to supply LIFEGATE with catheters for our young spina bifida patients. These are just a few examples of people who encourage and support us. We hope for the same peace between the people in the Palestinian territories and in Israel, that the young people of Kfar Tikvah and LIFEGATE were able to experience during their meeting before October 7th.

experience during their meeting before October 7th. In mid-November, the Palestinian municipality of Bethlehem canceled all traditional Christmas celebrations, decorations and lights. Instead of Christmas celebrations, mass rallies are to be held "to mourn and honor" the Palestinians killed in the Gaza Strip. We, too, are not in the mood for joyful, exuberant celebrations. But the hope in Jesus Christ, the light of the world, redemption through him and the possibility of mutual forgiveness through Him are unique. He alone is our hope in a world that has become darker. We celebrate this in our hearts, not just at Christmas, but every day of our lives.

is growing up with his grandmother as his parents are divorced. Due to damage to his brain. Imad has problems eating and swallowing food. Before Imad came to LIFEGATE, he spent almost all his time lying in bed, on the sofa or on the floor. With us he learned to sit in a wheelchair, so that he now uses one wheelchair at home and one at our facility. Imad is also learning to stand in a standing frame, which he is already able to do for an hour a day. Our speech and occupational therapists are working with Imad to improve his food intake and swallowing. Hydrotherapy and physiotherapy are used to promote his bodily functions and build up his muscles. Imad initially learned to roll on a mattress and reach toys. His eve-hand control is improving and Imad now responds to sounds and speech. Imad has begun a long journey into a new future. Above and beyond the professional support and care, it is the attention and love that children - like Imad receive at LIFEGATE that in more than one sense "lifts up" these children!

In September, two-and-a-half-year-old Imad joined

our group of children with multiple disabilities. Imad

Omar, a five-year-old autistic boy, has been at our special needs kindergarten for a year now. Initially, he took no notice of us and lived entirely in his own world. In the first few weeks, we cautiously made contact with him. Omar only looked at our therapists briefly at first, but the eye contact became longer and more intense every day. Omar then responded to his name, turned his head, began to understand cues and learned some rules when playing. Through being involved in many activities, the boy learned a lot more, including how to move more safely in traffic. Omar enjoys hydrotherapy in the water, which helps him to discover his body, and he can now almost swim on his own. In therapy with another child, both children learn to communicate with each other and share the therapists' attention.

Omar can memorize two expected sequences that we pronounce. He can now recognize and name colors and names fruits, vegetables and objects. Our speech therapists still use illustrated cards to help him communicate, but Omar already speaks short "twoword sentences". He knows the letters, reads short words and is beginning to deal with numbers. Gradually, Omar is moving more and more into "our" world. We are very happy about this wonderful development.

> It has been thirteen years since, Ramez, who was three years old at the time, came to the LIFEGATE special kindergarten. The little boy's diagnosis was severe: cerebral palsy (early childhood brain damage), attention deficit hyperactivity disorder and epilepsy. Ramez wanted to live and our Creator gave him a great deal of energy, the strength to face life and a love for people. I remember the many challenges in the development of this boy that our team had to overcome over the years. Sometimes we even wanted to give up, because for a while we couldn't get the parents to work with us. Today, we are glad that we kept seeing the small signs of encouragement and stayed patient with them. The parents are very grateful to us today. Ramez came to the LIFEGATE special school after our kindergarten and, after finishing school this summer, started an apprenticeship in our laundry. Here he is already able to operate the ironing machine and washing machines on his own. A young child with severe limitations has become a happy and independent teenager. Ramez is an example of how patience, love and professional care can improve a person's life and lead to independence.

After the summer vacation, we started having our young people meet once a week for sports activities. Basketball, soccer, table tennis and various group games promote community among the teenagers and young adults and strengthen their physical capabilities. Our physiotherapists lead this program, which is a lot of fun for everyone involved.

Help for people in need as a result of the war

There are many reports in the media about the suffering caused by the fighting of the Israeli armed forces against Hamas, Hezbollah and other terrorist militias. The reports usually focus on the dire situation of the civilian population in the Gaza Strip. In addition to the direct terrible suffering in the Gaza Strip and in the south and north of Israel, the war started by the Hamas attack on October 7 has also indirectly led to hardship beyond the combat zones. Many Palestinians have lost their jobs in Israel. As tourism has come to a complete standstill here, the many employees in the tourism industry, which is important for Bethlehem and the surrounding area. are unemployed. Our team alone has more than forty immediate family members who are affected. There are no aid programs from the Palestinian Authority and some families lack the money to buy even the essentials. In southern Israel and in the border region with Lebanon, over 200,000 people have been evacuated from their villages, some of which have been destroyed or are under threat of attack. Many of them were only able to pack one bag each and left everything else behind.

With the help of a German organization, which in turn receives support from the USA, we started a "first emergency aid" project. In this project, with the help of people with disabilities, we are able to bake seventy loaves of bread a day in the LIFEGATE bakery and prepare fifty meals in our kitchen, which we distribute to people in need according to the "meals on wheels" principle. We also distribute food vouchers to people in need and help them buy clothes (second-hand clothes and shopping vouchers). We would also like to provide help through two LIFEGATE team members who came to us from Gaza years ago and are still in contact with Christian families in the Gaza Strip. We hope to start as soon as the fighting has been over long enough for there to be safe transportation routes. All we can do at the moment is "patch up" the wounds and continue to live and practice reconciliation.

We would like to express our heartfelt thanks to the many people who have shown us signs of charity and solidarity in various ways during these difficult times. We have learned more than ever that we have friends behind us who support us through prayer and action. Some of them started campaigns for LIFEGATE at schools, in church congregations, in private circles of friends and thus help us to make up for our loss of local income (in our guest house, in the laundry service for hotels etc.) - thank you very much for this! We sincerely ask you to continue to support us - we want to do everything we can to provide the people entrusted to us with stability (which also includes financial stability).
